





Thanks After the "Great Flood"

The evening of Saturday, August 22nd brought with it several instances of flash flooding near Shade. The ditch running from the King place to the Center became a river and then a lake, which overflowed into the cafeteria and gym. Many people were there as the Shade Seniors were just beginning their monthly potluck, and Reid Hart and Carlos and Joyce Nicholson went into action. They were soon joined by Karen Jones, Brenda Ruth, Gail Jordan, and Jerry Foster. Later Denver Jordan and others including a couple young men who came for open gym basketball joined the effort.

Initially water came up at least eight inches on the outside of the cafeteria door and was two and half feet deep at the entrance to the lower boiler room. Water quickly ran to the far end of the gym and even into the sewing room. Mopping, wet vacuuming, and bailing began in earnest. Later, Denver contacted Dave Bircher, and Jerry contacted Manuel Grueser for pumps to assist, although by the time they arrived most of the water had been removed.

We are indeed fortunate that many were at the Center and that they sprang to action. Three hours later, over a thousand gallons of water had been removed from the building, which would have caused much damage, especially to the gym floor, had there not been people present to quickly address the situation.

The Green Bank Telescope

Radio astronomy? The Robert C. Byrd Green Bank Telescope? Gail Jordan presented some history about these at the August meeting of the Shade-Lodi History and Genealogy Association, following a unique experience earlier this summer when he attended the 50th anniversary reunion of the National Youth Science Camp. In 1969 Gail was introduced to the National Radio Astronomy Observatory (NRAO) at Green Bank, West Virginia when he received the honor to represent Iowa as one of two delegates from each state to attend the camp each year in Pocahontas County, West Virginia.

What made the experience unique was that the attendees at the reunion were the first people who were not either NRAO employees or official government visitors to be permitted to go up the telescope. Gail showed photos and described what it was like to be almost to the top of the 460 feet tall telescope.

The Green Bank Telescope is the largest fully steerable single-dish radio telescope in the world, and it weighs over 17 million pounds. The dish itself is the size of two football fields, and though it is mounted over two hundred feet up, it can be positioned to less than a thousandth of an inch of the desired position. The radio wave transmissions received provide scientists information about the nature of the universe.

Upcoming Renovations

With the generous bequest from Imogene Coen, we have begun plans for some long-awaited renovation projects. A new zero-turn lawn mower has been purchased, so that we don't have to impose on members to provide mowers for care of the grounds. We are gathering information and pricing to replace the two sets of double doors on the front entrances to the building. The goal is to improve the appearance, insulation value, and security of the doors. We hope to get the new doors installed before cold weather arrives.

Ms. Coen's will specifically mentioned improvements to the kitchen. Accordingly, we have decided to replace the heating system and to install a central air conditioning system in the kitchen/cafeteria section of the building, and to repair the roof leaks associated with the current furnace on the roof. In addition to the heating and cooling system, we have asked the prospective contractors to remove the walk-in freezer in the kitchen. This unit has never been used since we took possession of the building, and we really need the space. It is our intention to move the chest freezer into the space vacated by the walk-in unit, which will provide much-needed workspace; we expect some of the new heating equipment to be installed there as well. An additional item included in this phase of the kitchen project is repair of the exhaust system over the kitchen range. Two estimates for the heating/cooling system, removal of the walk-in freezer, range hood repair and roof repair work will be presented at the September 11 meeting of the Community Center Association. Upon approval of one of the estimates, work will begin as soon as possible.

After the heating/cooling system is installed and we can see how much space we have, several minor changes are planned for the kitchen. These include removal of the partitions next to the hand-washing sink (these enclose the drain intended for floor scrubbing water); raising the height of the dishwashing sink in the center of the kitchen; re-arranging the various work tables, etc. The goal is to maximize the work space and make it as efficient as possible. We also plan to repair the ceiling and repaint the entire kitchen and cafeteria.

Another major project we hope to complete is updating of the women's restroom. This will include new stall partitions, new toilets and sinks, and new floor covering.

We hope you will notice the changes the next time you come to the Center for a meeting or event, and we hope Ms. Coen would have been pleased.

July – August Minutes

Meeting was called to order by President Pat Davidson and all stood for the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes from June were approved as written. Motion by Alex, second by Manuel.

Treasurer's Report: Alex reported a negative balance on the monthly accounting due to payment on second half of playground. Check book balance was \$169,776.91. The bequest made \$129 in interest while sitting in checking.

Investment Committee reported on three possible funds/investors which are being considered and gave the following information:

Mark Snyder, who shows a 10 year average return of 7.9%. His account would be split between several different funds. His fee is 1% of return annually.

Primerica – Edna Frost, who shows a return of 4.2 - 4.6% and places her investments in one mutual fund. She charges a one time set fee of around \$5000.

Wells Fargo – Jim Karageorge, who shows a 4.2% return and also charges a 1% annual fee.

Discussion and vote was tabled until the September meeting in hopes more people will be in attendance. Motion to table made by Richard Coe, second Manuel.

Corresponding Secretary Report: Sympathy cards being sent to Janet Howard Bell, Roger Howard and Richard Howard.

Vice President Report: Jerseyville Royalty has been invited to attend the Athens Co. Fair luncheon. Redbud School group was given a tour of the building for those who were not able to attend the first tour. Had question as to if they would be given a key for their use. Pat Davidson will handle this when the rental contract is signed. They would also still like to have a sewing class and mentioned perhaps paying a small fee for an instructor. They have their own sewing machines. Heidi asked how much they would be paying a month. The original idea was \$150, but nothing has been decided. Also Heidi wanted to use the craft/homeschool room every other Tuesday from 6 to 8 p.m., there did not seem to be any problem with that.

Pat and Peggy will keep the membership posted on the home school situation.

Maintenance Committee: no report

History Group: no report

Senior Group: Roberta stated Seniors were taking a bit of a break and the only activity planned is a cookout for July 25.

Old Business:

Playground has begun- initial holes and platform started on 7/23. A work day was planned for 7/27. All materials and equipment is on site. Once things are set up there will need to be concrete work and then the filter cloth and mulch can be put into place.

Kitchen- At the meeting on 7/10 the committee talked about priorities. Heating and cooling were selected as priority #1. Joe Davidson has agreed to type up a bid sheet and meet with the contractors at the building to begin the process of getting bids. Pat has contacted 5 contractors who are interested in bidding on the installation of a new furnace and central air conditioning unit. Estimates can be expected in 30 days. The plan is to remove the furnace from the roof, repair the roof, remove the unused walk-in freezer from the kitchen and utilize some of that area to install a new furnace. If there is room, chest freezer and possibly refrigerators will be moved into the vacant space left. The committee also discussed the need for more prep space, raising the dishwashing sink, repairing the dishwasher, removing the dump sink, cleaning and painting and other cosmetic changes. Decisions on these projects were left until after the furnace/AC project is completed.

New Business:

Heidi asked about the possibility of the Center sponsoring a class on aromatherapy. Since the person wanting to do this is a vendor it was agree to allow on class at no charge and after that, it would not be free. That would allow those who have interest can see if they would wish to pay to attend. Heidi also asked about having some people come in and give a talk about horses in the winter. It was agreed that could be considered a community service.

Fran bought a cooler that fits in a rope handled bucket and asked about buying the bucket. Peggy moved to get the bucket and Roberta seconded.

Norm moved to adjourn. Manuel seconded.



Cooks Corner

Pumpkin Apple Streusel Muffins



- 2 ½ cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 T pumpkin pie spice
- 1 t baking soda
- ½ t salt
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1 cup canned pumpkin puree
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- 2 cups peeled, cored and chopped apples
- 2 T flour
- ¼ cup sugar
- ½ t ground cinnamon
 - 4 t butter

Directions

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease 18 muffin cups or use paper liners.
- In a large bowl, sift together 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, 2 cups sugar, pumpkin pie spice, baking soda and salt. In a separate bowl, mix together eggs, pumpkin and oil. Add pumpkin mixture to flour mixture; stirring just to moisten. Fold in apples. Spoon batter into prepared muffin cups.
- In a small bowl, mix together 2 tablespoons flour, 1/4 cup sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle topping evenly over muffin batter.
- Bake in preheated oven for 35 to 40 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into a muffin comes out clean.
