The Many Barns of Ohio

In "The Barnbuilders: An **Architectural Legacy in Ohio's Rural** Landscape", Tom O'Grady showed members of the Shade-Lodi History and Genealogy Association last year how the cultural types that settled different regions of Ohio each built different types of barns. Tom, who previously had given programs on Indian mounds and the canals in Ohio, is President of the Athens County Historical Society and Museum, and he is a long-time Professor of Astronomy at Ohio University. Many years ago, Professor Hubert Wilhelm got Tom interested in barns, and he shared his passion with us, arousing our interest as well.

Of the many different styles of barns, three are most common in Ohio: In northern and southeastern Ohio, which were settled by New Englanders, "Yankee" or New England barns predominate. These can be identified by their side entrances and 3-bay construction, where one bay was for storing grain, one bay was for

storing hay, and the middle bay was a threshing floor.

In central Ohio, German or Pennsylvania Dutch barns predominate. These are also known as "banked barns", since they are typically built into a slope so that there is a ramp up to the threshing floor. There is an overhang on the opposite side for shelter of livestock, as animals were kept in the lower level. Southern or Virginia barns predominate in southern Ohio. These are characterized by entrances from the gable ends; some have sheds on each side and are called "Transverse Southern Barns".

Tom showed dozens of photographs of barns that he has visited all over the state. These included many fine examples of the main types noted above, as well as many others such as unusual stone, round, octagonal, double, and western Ohio hybrid barns.

The original barn builders came into Ohio along Indian trails, and their craftsmanship is renowned. Tom noted that original barns were so well built that the additions made years later deteriorate before the barns themselves. He also commented on how important barns were to livelihood, "Fine barns built many fine houses; no house ever built a barn!" Old barns house remnants of the primeval forest that once covered the North American continent. Tulip poplars and American Chestnuts provided much of the very dense, hard, and strong wood that early settlers used to frame their barns.

When we buil, let us think we build forever. Let it not be for present delight nor for present use alone. Let it be such work that our descendants will thank us for, and let us think, as we lay stone upon stone, that a time is to come when these stones will be held sacred because our hands have touched them, and that men will say, as they look upon the labor and wrought substance of them, "See! This our fathers did for us." -- John Ruskin (1819 - 1900)


Easter Egg Hunt

The Grueser Family

A scrapbook, "My Autobiography" composed by Mark A. Grueser when he was in school, provided much information about the roots of the Grueser family for the November 2014 SLHGA program.

The Gruesers in this area trace their ancestry to Peter and Mary Grueser, who were both born about 1805 in Bavaria, Germany. They immigrated to the United States and settled in Orange Township, Meigs County, Ohio. Their son John, who was born in 1845, and his wife Mary Ann Gress Grueser were the parents of Charles Grueser. Charles, who was born in 1872, married Elizabeth Lieb in 1895. Charles and Elizabeth were the paternal grandparents of Manuel and Malcolm and their brothers.

Mark William Grueser was born in 1907 and married Mary Katherine Goett in 1941. They had six sons: Mark A., Michael, Manuel, Max, Matthew and Malcom.

Black/White ... Fight, Fight

My first introduction to basketball at my high school alma mater was in the late forties when the players wore those sharp black and white warmup slacks and jackets. They were a class act and won a lot of ballgames in their cracker box sized gym. I remember names like Roger Williams, Johnnie Niggemeyer, Barney Henderson, Bob Hawk and Bill Knight. Those boys looked like they were ten feet tall to me as they went through their warmup drills like the Harlem Globetrotters.

My parents always went to the home games, and after the games I was one of the young urchins who would take over the court in their sock feet and shoot baskets. If no basketball was available, we would improvise with a wadded up ball of paper; we didn't mind, it was still fun.

The gym was so small, the feet of the bottom row of spectators were actually in the field of play. This meant that to in-bound from the sideline, a player would have to stick his foot into the crowd to be out of bounds. The bleachers were only three rows deep and the three jump ball circles nearly overlapped. The scoreboard at the Shade gym was on the stage end and was part of a wooden scorer's desk with large numerals mounted on wire loops. Students eagerly did the number flipping when points were scored. The foul lane in those days was only six-feet wide and the preferred shot from outside was the two handed set shot while the preferred foul shot was the underhanded shot.

There were nine teams in the Athens County League at that time, and they too had small cracker box sized gyms. The perennial favorites were the Ames Bern Greenies with their green and white colors coached by Charley McAfee. They always seemed to have a good team year after year. Their gym had balcony seating on one side that was accessed by a folding wooden wall in an upper school hallway. Buchtel York's blue and yellow mascot was the Bruin, and their gym floor was unique in that the wood blocks were set on end, like a butcher block. J-T stood for Jacksonville-Trimble and the Cardinals carried red and white colors. Rome Canaan's Spartans' colors were red and black as were the Albany Red Devils. The Carthage Troy Trojans sported orange and black and their backboards were smaller with the top corners lopped off at an angle. Waterloo's colors were black and yellow and The Plains Indians uniforms were blue and gold. The Shade Panthers had the most unique color combination in my opinion, simply and boldly, black and white. There were four other public high schools in the county that participated in other sports leagues. Those were Athens, Nelsonville, Glouster and Chauncey Dover and were big enough to field a football team. There were no football sports in the Athens County League.

Tournament time was always full of excitement for the Athens County League. The brackets would be drawn up each February and play would begin at the Men's Gym on the Ohio University campus in Athens. The gym was so big compared to the cracker box sized gyms, it was easy to get turned around and forget which end was your basket. That actually happened to one of Shade's players, Andy Hudnall. Even though Andy's teammates tried to stop him, he plowed ahead anyhow and made a basket for the opposing team.

There was a little excitement one year when the Panthers were hosting Tuppers Plains, a school from nearby Meigs County. A player by the name of Caldwell made a breakaway drive for the south basket where his only defender was Shade's Robert Gwinn who, in defense, turned his hip toward the driving Caldwell. The hip flip elevated Caldwell who flew up into the air and came down with a thud on the maple hardwood. It was an obvious flagrant foul and Gwinn was kicked out of the game.

The biggest skirmish at a Shade sporting event happened one night in 1953 when Leon Henson and an opposing player got into an argument near the west sideline. Unbeknownst to the opposing player, Leon's dad, foolishly, stepped out onto the court and struck the boy from behind on the side of the head. As you would imagine, all hell broke loose at that point. I can still see Ruby Elswick swinging her purse at someone. Play was suspended after the crowd settled down, and, from then on, a security guard was present at the Shade basketball games.

There was a time of absolute hilarity on the hardwood one year when a touring outfit scheduled "Donkey Basketball" at Shade High School. The company provided the rubber-shoed donkeys and the community provided the riders. I can recall Jack Ruth, Joe Perry, my dad and others having the time of their life and of course the fans enjoyed it as well, especially when the donkeys either refused to budge or bucked off their riders.

Perhaps the best player to don the black and white was a 1954 graduate, Merrill Oxley. He was the local LeBron James of his day. Merrill stood about 6'2" and was a coordinated athlete who excelled in all sports. He played the key position in basketball and had an excellent turn-around jump shot that was an automatic two points. It was not uncommon for Merrill to score into the thirties and forties, but there was one game against Harrisonville where he eclipsed the fifty point barrier.

A regular opponent for the Shade Panthers basketball team was BIS, short for Boys Industrial School from Lancaster, Ohio. These boys were incarcerated for bad behavior of some sort, and the atmosphere was always different when they came to play. There was never any trouble, but they came without any fans, so all of the cheering was one sided in favor of the home team.

I played basketball as did my two older brothers for Shade High. The teams I was a part of were not that successful except for a fourth place team trophy in the eighth grade. The trophy was the smallest one in the school trophy case, but I felt a sense of pride in that little trophy nevertheless. My younger sister was on the cheerleading squad for the Panthers last team before consolidation with two other school districts. She was one of the last Panthers to cheer, Black/White...Fight, Fight.



Tracy Hanning was a 1958 graduate of Shade High School. He earned a Bachelor's degree from Ohio University in 1962 and a Master's degree from Wright State University in 1971. After a full teaching career, he owned and operated a small business in the Dayton area specializing in residential roofing.

SCCA Draft Minutes – February 11, 2015

- Members present: Ray Baker, Norm Shaner, Rhonda Meeks, Jerry Foster, Fran Moxley, Robin Krivesti, Glenna Grim, Heidi Marty, Roberta Henderson, Grace Dorst, Manuel Grueser, Tom Winning, Jr., Teresa Winning, Marvin Marty, Pat Davidson, Steve Kane.
- Marvin Marty led the Pledge of Allegiance
- The minutes of the January 14 meeting were approved with one minor correction. Motion to approve, Ray; second, Fran; all in favor.
- Treasurer's Report: In Alex's absence, Marvin distributed the January statement. After ignoring the most recent purchase of kitchen equipment (which will be offset by funds from the Coen bequest), the Association broke even for the month. Current balance in the checking account is \$15,030.32.
- Vice President Report: Peggy distributed the calendar for February and March. A few additions were made: The Seniors Association will serve the Athens County Trustees Dinner on May 2nd; the Alumni Banquet will be held on May 9th; the Community Yard Sale is scheduled for June 6.
- Fran reported that she sold five cookbooks recently, and received an email from Stephanie Hysmith with compliments about the cookbook. Stephanie and her husband. David Mould, have moved to Charleston, W.Va.
- Corresponding Secretary: Heidi reported that we have received several new and renewing membership forms. Heidi suggested that the Association give membership cards to people when they pay dues. After a brief discussion, Fran moved that the Association issue membership cards which will be printed in the computer room; Heidi seconded; motion passed.
- Maintenance report: The lock on the single gym door has been repaired; the malfunctioning boiler was repaired; the replacement pump motor (for the boiler circulating pump) has been received and installed, but now the formerly functioning pump needs repair. Jerry has received a replacement for half of the sign hanging on the front of the building; this will replace the half which blew off in an earlier windy storm, and will be hung when weather permits. Rhonda reported that the Township Trustees have agreed to fill potholes and spread gravel on the Center's parking lot (this was done on Feb. 11); they will also plow heavy snow if we get any. Heidi reported that the carpet in one of the second-floor rooms needs cleaning. Marv will ask Captain Steamer to give an estimate on the job.
- Seniors Association: Manuel reported that there was no meeting in January, and will be on hiatus until weather improves.
- Youth Wrestling: Season is done. Gail reported (via email) that we collected \$1,300 net income in concessions and our share of the admission at meets; \$507 of that total was collected at the meet with Athens, which is a record for a single meet.
- There was a continuation of the discussion about the township levy which provides funding for the Center's utilities and insurance premiums, which will expire in December 2015. Rhonda has learned from the County Prosecutor's Office that we cannot use more descriptive wording on the ballot (Community Center category is not appropriate for our situation). Issues yet to be decided: should the levy be increased or decreased? Should it be listed as a renewal (based on the property tax rate which was in effect when the levy was first approved) or as a replacement (based on the property tax rate which will be in effect in January 2016). Property taxes are expected to increase, so this is an important issue. It was agreed that the subject would be further discussed at the March SCCA meeting, but decisions must be made at that time due to the lengthy approval process to get the levy listed on the November ballot.
- The Rental Agreement Review Committee distributed proposed changes. It was agreed that the content of the Agreement will be discussed at the March meeting, after people have time to read and consider the proposed changes. Peggy mentioned the need to make the Agreement form available for short-notice renters. Marv suggested an outdoor display case. Jerry moved that we install an outdoor display case; the motion was amended to say pricing of such cases should be researched; Heidi seconded the motion; it passed. Jerry and Robin agreed to get pricing. Heidi reported that she has talked with a local artist who is interested in possibly renting studio space at the Center. She will get more details.
- Marvin reported that the Lost in Lodi committee is still looking for someone to sell concessions on the day of the race (Sunday, March 29). After some
 discussion, it was decided that Heidi would organize a group of volunteers to prepare and sell hot sandwiches, popcorn, soft drinks, etc.; proceeds will go to the
 Center.
- Rhonda reminded everyone that the deadline to submit materials for the upcoming March-April newsletter is Friday, February 20. Fran suggested that the Honored Volunteer for this issue be Rhonda's 4-H club, in recognition of their many valuable contributions to several fundraising events, such as the upcoming Valentine Dinner. All agreed.
- Marvin suggested that we put up a suggestion box at the Lodi General Store, to solicit input from the community about activities or services which could be
 offered at the Center. All agreed.
- Jerry suggested upgrades to the first-floor hallway, to improve its appearance and to make it easier to see the class photos hung on the walls. He proposed
 adding two light fixtures, replacing all ceiling tile, and painting the ceiling suspension gridwork. Norman moved the project be done as proposed; Teresa
 seconded; motion passed.
- Valentine Dinner: will be held this Saturday, Feb. 14. Jerry reported that he has stopped accepting reservations as of today (Feb. 11). In 2014, we had seating for 230; this year we need seats for 249. He expects to serve approximately 280, including volunteers.
- Ray moved to adjourn; Teresa seconded; all in favor.
