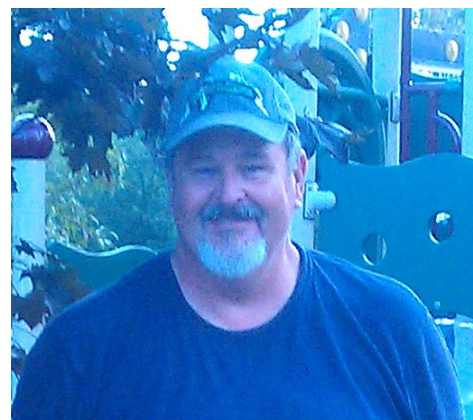

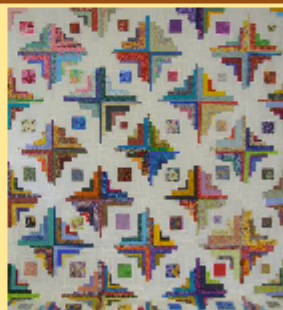

Final stop is for lunch at Ralph and Amy Calvert's and the Fossil Rock Raiders Train Barn.

History will be shared at each stop, including printed handouts of information and photos.

Note: Because of the auto tour this month, there will be no regular history meeting on the third Tuesday in September.

Brick Industry in Athens County

At the June meeting of the Shade-Lodi History and Genealogy Association, Cyrus Moore used historical photos to follow the rise and decline of local industries based on clay. Cyrus, a Shade native, has a bachelor degree in history from Ohio University, and he is currently pursuing a master's degree at Kent State University emphasizing Ohio military history.

The unglaciated clays and shales of southeastern Ohio are close to the surface and have proven ideal for manufacturing numerous brick and related products over the years. Clays and coal deposits are located in alternating layers, so clay industries are often associated with coal operations. Fire clays fire white or yellow and are strong and heat-resistant, while shales that contain iron, and therefore fire red or purple, exhibit less strength and resistance to heat.

Early buildings used brick that were fired nearby in temporary kilns. The first brick dwelling was the home of the Athens Mirror newspaper; it was constructed in 1818 on Union Street at the site of what later was the old post office. Cutler Hall on the Ohio University campus was another early building. In the 1870s, Robert Arscott made bricks for the Athens County Courthouse, Athens City Building, and the asylum. Thaddeus Longstreth began producing bricks in Nelsonville, also in the 1870s.



The Athens Brick Company operated from 1892 into the 1920s. 5000 bricks per day were fired in a double row of kilns located where the post office on Stimson Avenue is now. Shale was taken from North Hill, in front of which years later after the excavations, the armory was built at the end of Court Street (photo above, circa 1914). Wassall Brick Company operated in Glouster from about 1895 to 1932. Trimble Brick Company had more kilns than Athens and also continued to produce bricks until the late 1920s or early 1930s.

Nelsonville Brick Company comprised three separate facilities: Nelsonville Sewer Pipe Company began in the 1880s and made only paving brick after an 1896 fire. It merged with Nelsonville Brick Company in 1905. The company developed the renowned Star Brick design to provide traction for workers in slaughter houses and for street pavers in the 1890s. Hocking Valley Fire Clay Company opened in 1907, then operated separately when bought out by Nelsonville Brick Company in 1916. In 1926, the company was renamed Athena Glazed Brick Company, which made salt glazed brick that was marketed as resistant to vines. The Ohio Fireproofing plant at Diamond was included later.

Interesting notes: Cyrus showed photos of many of the locally produced paving bricks. Street pavers are often laid on their sides so one can't tell where they were made. The unique glazed brick in the hallways and restrooms of the first floor of the Shade Community Center came from McArthur, when the school was built in 1936, and may have been made by Puritan (later McArthur) Brick Company.

 - New Locks and keys have been purchased for storage areas. New keys were circulated to the current key holders. Spare keys are available for occasional use.
- History Group reported that Tom O'Grady would be speaking Tuesday, July 15th on Ohio Barns
- Seniors reported that they are waiting on the Annual Grant from Athens County.
- The By-Laws and Standing Rules committee presented their recommendations for revisions to the current documents.
 - By-Laws : Fran moved to accept the recommendations/revisions as submitted, Robin seconded, the motion passed.
 - Stand Rules: Fran moved that the recommendations/revisions be accepted as modified, Robin seconded, the motion passed.
- The Cook Book Project: deadline for submission of recipes is July 11, 214. Volunteers will meet on July 22 to format and type the submitted recipes, making ready to send to the printer.
- Door replacement status: HOON, the supplier, gave a quote on a wrong door, they should have a corrected quote within a few days.
- Kitchen improvements: All ordered items have been received, the committee is now in the process of organizing the area. Upcoming projects will include ceiling repair, new curtains and possibly painting before Jerseyville Festival, October 4, 2014.
- Motion to adjourn made by Robin, Heidi offered a second, motion passed, meeting adjourned.

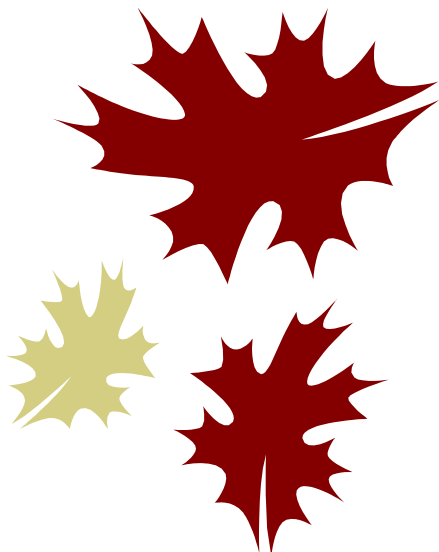

Cook's Corner

Cream Cheese Pumpkin Muffins

Ingredients

4 eggs
1 2/3 cup sugar
1 cup vegetable oil
1 (15 oz.) can pumpkin puree
2 cups flour
2 t baking powder
1 t salt
1 t baking soda
2 t cinnamon



6 ounces cream cheese
6 T butter, softened
3 cups confectionary's sugar

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 9x13 pan.

Beat eggs, sugar, oil and pumpkin.

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, baking soda and cinnamon.

Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool.

Frosting

Beat together cream cheese, butter and confectionary's sugar.

Spread over cooled cake.
