It was a fun-filled day for everyone!



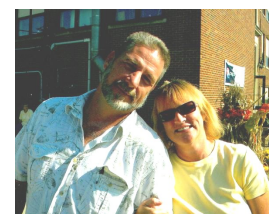
Honored Volunteers

Meeting Minutes

Summary of September Meeting

SCCA, September 12, 2012

Meeting called to order by president Pat Davidson.

Members present: Norm Shaner, Jerry Foster, Gail Jordan, Richard Grim, Glenna Grim, Teresa Winning, Steve Kane, Robin Krivesti, Peggy Grueser, Malcolm Grueser, Rose Grueser, Manuel C. Grueser, Grace Dorst, Roberta Henderson, Pat Davidson, Alex Couladis, Peggy Rist, Debbie McAdoo and Rhonda Meeks.

Minutes were reviewed and accepted as corrected; motion by Teresa Winning, seconded by Manuel Grueser.

Treasurer's report shows \$23,637.15 in the checking account.

It was announced that Fran Moxley would resign her position as corresponding secretary due to illness in her family. We are seeking nominations for that position. V.P. Peggy Rist circulated the updated calendar for the remainder of the year. The members reviewed the calendar, and made additions as were appropriate.

Maintenance committee reported that grounds work such as mowing, weed eating, weed killing, mulching was in full force. Amy Calvert put much effort into cleaning and grooming the flower beds in front of the building. Gail reported that all fire extinguishers have been recharged and the boiler inspection was complete. New locks have been placed on the folding gates between second and third floors, keys were exchanged with key holders.

History group, no report as the September meeting was canceled due to lack of presenters.

The senior's group reported on an AFAN meeting on October 11, 2012, they would prepare the meal for AFAN members.

Steve reported on the Playground project, saying that the grant has moved forward for the second round of review by the Sisters of St. Joseph Foundation. The Athens Foundation has been contacted regarding funding as well.

Rhonda gave an update on the Jerseyville royalty. Crowns have been ordered and received. It was more economical to order in bulk, therefore having enough for two years. Judges have been se-

cured; judging will be on September 30, 2012 at the Center.

Further discussion on signs for the walking path. It was decided that they would read "ABSOLUTELY NO MOTORIZED VEHICLES ON WALKING PATH". Two sign will be installed.

Thank you cards were received from the Robinson and Goldsberry families.

Athens United Appeal will be holding its annual resource fair at the Market on State on October 6th. SCCA will attend, having a table with information about the Center; Teresa will take the quilt for show that will be raffled at Jerseyville Festival.

Election will be November 6th. Discussion was tabled regarding having food available to sell to voters.

Pat reported that the homeschooler's group would not be returning this year. This will represent a loss of revenue for the center.

SCCA has been asked to host computer classes being offered through Tri County Community Agency, October 16 & 17, 2012.

We have also been made aware of FEMA funding to compensate for expenses incurred by any damage from the storms of late June.

Regarding outdoor electric for special events, Jerry brought to the floor the possibility of having a portable electric panel hard wired to the main box. This would be phase I, with phase II to add 4 more circuits at a later date. Estimated cost of \$500.00 with labor being donated by Ron Hedrick and Bryan Lynch, electricians that did the indoor wiring last winter/spring. Alex moved that we move forward with this, Peggy giving a second. All were in favor of the motion.

Rhonda announced a community meal on 10/20/12 hosted by the Shade Methodist Church, also that the Church would be passing out free smoke detectors and batteries to members of the community.

Jerry circulated a sign up letter for helpers at Jerseyville Festival. Fran will take the lead on the kitchen workers.

Alex moved to adjourn the meeting, Marvin seconded. All in favor.

The minutes from the last meeting were reviewed and approved as corrected.

Signs forbidding motorized vehicles on the walking path have been installed, as well as the portable electric panel.

Gail reported that the History group would be learning about the history of area post offices, Shade included.

Roberta reported that the Senior group would be preparing the AFAN luncheon. They are also involved with the float for the Veterans Day parade and a lunch honoring veterans of the Lodi area.

Steve Kane received notice that the Sisters of St. Joseph have granted the Center \$8000.00 toward the children's playground.

Theresa Winning and Peggy Rist represented the Center at the United Appeal Resource Fair. They reported that there were few patrons and the day was cold and

long.

Internet classes, free of charge will be offered by Community Action in our computer lab October 16/17, 1-4 p.m.

VP, Peggy Rist will step up to lead the November meeting as Pat will be out of town

An election day meal will be provided November 6th. We will be seeking volunteers to cook and serve food. A menu of soups and cornbread has been recommended.

A nomination committee for 2013 officers consisting of Robin Krivisti, Fran Moxley (and possibly Walter Jones) was appointed.

Final preparation for Jerseyville Festival was discussed. Royalty, set up for outdoor activities, kitchen schedule, foods, pricing etc.

Robin gave update on the Halloween party asking for volunteers for the night of the event as well as for Friday night to stuff the candy bags.

Alex moved that the meeting be adjourned, Malcolm gave a second, all in favor, meeting closed.

Recollections of a Shade High School Teacher, 1962-1965 Part V

I was raised in Sandusky, on Lake Erie, and my family lived on one acre. For a relatively urban family we had a large garden and my oldest brother raised chickens for a while. Otherwise, we had no animals. At Shade, gardening was taken for granted and many students came from homes with animals, and even part-time farming operations. Aside from full-scale farms, some families had a horse, perhaps a cow, and many raised chickens. Caring for and relating to animals was an aspect of daily life for many Shade students.

I recall a junior named Joe who returned from a weekend visit to Athens with the following story: "I was a few blocks from Court Street, passing one of the fraternity houses when I saw a group of guys trying to get a horse to enter their fraternity house. Realizing it was probably a prank of some kind, I stood nearby, simply watching. One of the guys saw me and called out, "Do you know anything about horses?"

"More than you do," Joe shouted back.

"For five dollars can you get this horse to go up the steps and into this house?"

"I suppose so," Joe said.

He approached the horse and told the fraternity members---"pledges", evidently---to stand back. He let the horse relax a little, spoke to it, and then swatted it on the rear end. The horse walked up steps and from there, Joe gently guided him into the house, prior to accepting five dollars.

Joe and others at Shade knew a lot about animals, but the real master among us was a "sleeper" from the teachers' points of view: Manuel Grueser. Manuel brought the proverb, "You can't tell a book by its cover" fully to life. On the outside, he was a tobacco chewing farm boy who managed to get through school with a little help from his friends. Inside, unseen by teachers, there was solid gold, and even literary talent.

As I recall, Manuel has, and used, a buckboard, a surrey and other horse-drawn vehicle. He often rode to school on his horse. While polite, Manuel never tried to shine up to teachers, so I came to know him only gradually. My understanding of him greatly changed one spring day in my second year at Shade, when I assigned his English class the theme: "*Why I Like Spring*."

I have shared the remarkable essay he wrote that day with hundreds of people, from one end of this nation to the other. I once sent it to Pete Seger, the folk singer, who penned a warm thank-you. Now I share this with you, Manuel's friends and neighbors. Perhaps publishing this now, with winter still ahead of us, helps assure us that spring truly will return.

The spelling and punctuations are Manuel's, and so is the deep feeling for farming, and for life in general.

Why I Like Spring

Spring is a wonderful time of year when the birds start humming, the frogs start croaking, the fish start biting, and everything starts to green up. And before to long the crops you sowed in the fall start greening up like your wheat, winter oats, and the grass starts growing into hay. And before to long you start plowing for corn if you haven't already don it during the winter, then you sick the ground for corn, then you cultivate it and that's about all the work you do in the beginning of and latter part of spring. I really enjoy the sweet freshness of the air. It don't smell half bad when you start hawling away the winters manure especially when you go to getting on inside the pile after it has heated all winter and the spring air blowing its rich odor around you. It ain't long after this that the water starts warming up and before you know it your in the water swimming and splashing around and having a good time. People start getting their horses out and start riding, probably for the first time since fall, but I can't say as that fits me cause I ride winter, summer alike. Springs a lot of fun and a lot to see. The ground hogs start stirring around and so do the snakes. Their really nice little fellers.

Spring is a nice time of year if you can enjoy it but you just can't get the full value of spring sitting at a desk in a school room listening to a few teachers that are always raising "Hell" with somebody. But next year it will be different because I will be home most of the time doing what I want to do without somebody telling you what to do or how to do it like they do at school. I think I will enjoy getting out of the "Pen" to enjoy these wonderful things that I have hardly seen for the past twelve years.
